



Computer Virus Protection

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Nowadays there are as many people generating harmful computer programs as there are building helpful or merely innocent software. At least that's the way it seems. "Malware" is the generic name that covers this plethora of sins — viruses, trojans, rootkits, spyware, adware, ransomware, and more. Viruses are less common than they used to be—malware today is about making money, and it's more profitable to steal your computer's information than to destroy it.

If you have a computer today, you need a good anti-malware program. If you are trusting Windows Defender, which is included with Windows 10, then you need something better, according to PC Magazine's Neil Rubenking. There are several free programs that are very good, though the ones you pay for can be better.
